Voting in 2020

As I mentioned last week in my homily, we are called to apply our faith when we do the important work of voting. We Catholics do well to review the USCCB's document from 2015 entitled, Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship. Here are some relevant excerpts in light of the concerns I expressed last week about matters concerning abortion and growing concerns about the press to embrace transgenderism. I know the conversation about these matters is very controversial and our current political climate is very fractious. I am striving to be a faithful shepherd.

- 31. Decisions about political life are complex and require the exercise of a well-formed conscience aided by prudence. This exercise of conscience begins with outright opposition to laws and other policies that violate human life or weaken its protection. Those who knowingly, willingly, and directly support public policies or legislation that undermine fundamental moral principles cooperate with evil.

 32. Sometimes morally flawed laws already exist. In this situation, the process of framing legislation to protect life is subject to prudential judgment and "the art of the possible." . . Such incremental improvements in the law are acceptable as steps toward the full restoration of justice. However, Catholics must never abandon the moral requirement to seek full protection for all human life from the moment of conception until natural death.
- 33. Prudential judgment is also needed in applying moral principles to specific policy choices in areas such as armed conflict, housing, health care, immigration, and others. This does not mean that all choices are equally valid, or that our guidance and that of other Church leaders is just another political opinion or policy preference among many others. Rather, we urge Catholics to listen carefully to the Church's teachers when we apply Catholic social teaching to specific proposals and situations. The judgments and recommendations that we make as bishops on such specific issues do not carry the same moral authority as statements of universal moral teachings. Nevertheless, the Church's guidance on these matters is an essential resource for Catholics as they determine whether their own moral judgments are consistent with the Gospel and with Catholic teaching.
- 34. Catholics often face difficult choices about how to vote. This is why it is so important to vote according to a wellformed conscience that perceives the proper relationship among moral goods. A Catholic cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, deliberately subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning, or racist behavior, if the voter's intent is to support that position. In such cases, a Catholic would be guilty of formal cooperation in grave evil. At the same time, a voter should not use a candidate's opposition to an intrinsic evil to justify <u>indifference or inattentiveness to other important moral issues</u> <u>involving human life and dignity</u>. (Emphasis added.) 35. There may be times when a Catholic who rejects a candidate's unacceptable position even on policies promoting an intrinsically evil act may reasonably decide to vote for that candidate for other morally grave reasons. Voting in this way would be permissible only for truly grave moral reasons, not to advance narrow interests or partisan preferences or to

<u>ignore a fundamental moral evil</u>. (Emphasis added.)
As I mentioned in some of the homilies this past weekend, the threshold the USCCB offers here is very high.

Guidance from St. Gregory the Great to Spiritual Guides At the 9:00 & 11:00 a.m. Masses, I quoted from St. Gregory the Great's Pastoral Guide, which was the second reading in the Office of Readings for last Sunday. I read it in the morning, and thanked the Lord for the providence of this particular reading, given the message that I felt called to preach this past weekend. As you might imagine, I take this exhortation very seriously. I likewise encourage all parents, grandparents, teachers, etc., to take these words seriously for themselves as well:

A spiritual guide should be silent when discretion requires and speak when words are of service. Otherwise he may say what he should not or be silent when he should speak. Indiscreet speech may lead men into error and an imprudent silence may leave in error those who could have been taught. Pastors who lack foresight hesitate to say openly what is right because they fear losing the favor of men. As the voice of truth tells us, such leaders are not zealous pastors who protect their flocks, rather they are like mercenaries who flee by taking refuge in silence when the wolf appears.

The Lord reproaches them through the prophet: <u>They are dumb dogs that cannot bark.</u> On another occasion he <u>complains: You did not advance against the foe or set up a wall in front of the house of Israel, so that you might stand fast in battle on the day of the Lord.</u> To advance against the foe involves a bold resistance to the powers of this world in defense of the flock. To stand fast in battle on the day of the Lord means to oppose the wicked enemy out of love for what is right.

When a pastor has been afraid to assert what is right, has he not turned his back and fled by remaining silent? Whereas if he intervenes on behalf of the flock, he sets up a wall against the enemy in front of the house of Israel. Therefore, the Lord again says to his unfaithful people: Your prophets saw false and foolish visions and did not point out your wickedness, that you might repent of your sins. The name of the prophet is sometimes given in the sacred writings to teachers who both declare the present to be fleeting and reveal what is to come. The word of God accuses them of seeing false visions because they are afraid to reproach men for their faults and they consequently lull the evildoer with an empty promise of safety. Because they fear reproach, they keep silent and fail to point out the sinner's wrongdoing Those are powerful and difficult words to read and preach. If you would, please pray for me and all spiritual leaders will be faithful shepherds who are willing and able to follow the pattern that St. Gregory articulates here. Be assured of my prayers for you.

Last weekend, I mentioned that a Eucharistic Procession was planned for November 14th, but I had forgotten that we will have the women's retreat November 12th through 14th. The plan now is to have the Eucharistic Procession on Sunday the 15th at 2:00 p.m. We will have more details about that procession in coming weeks.
