Rejoice!

This, the fourth Sunday of Lent, is called by that name because of the beginning of the opening antiphon for today's Mass: "Laetare Jerusalem," which is translated, "Rejoice, Jerusalem!" And we do rejoice. We are at the midway point of this season of penance, looking forward to the celebration of the holiest week of the Christian year. Just as we do the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday), today the priest wears "Rose" vestments. Let us, indeed, be joyful that we are sons and daughters of God through our baptism.

God's Providence and the Healing of Memories Last Sunday, I preached about God's healing, and included quotes from a book the parish gave away a year and a half ago. I encourage everyone to consider (re-)reading it.

When we see our past in the light of the Holy Spirit, with the eyes of God, it is created anew. What we pray for in the Psalms comes true: "Make us glad as many days as you have afflicted us, and as many years as we have seen evil" (Ps 90:15). We receive a completely new past. The best moment for this transformation of our past is, of course, at the Eucharist. Do we really mean it when we say: "Say but the word and I shall be healed?" He comes to us to heal all wounds, to transform all sorrow into joy. Do we give him the opportunity to heal us? Do we show him our wounds? We pray: "In your wounds you hide me." "By his wounds you have been healed", we read in the first letter of Peter (2:24). The more we come in contact with these wounds, the more all of our wounds heal. In the Eucharist, the Lord comes to us wounded and sacrificed. That is the right moment to pray: "Jesus, heal these wounds." As soon as you show him your wounds and expose yourself to his healing power, the healing process begins, one that is not like ordinary healing. It is not a question of something old that has caused you much pain and finally ceases to torment you. The healing goes back into time and transforms the very moment when you were hurt into a moment of grace. The very wound that was the cause of so much suffering is transformed into a blessing, and all the bitterness it caused is changed into meaningful and fruitful suffering. When Israel could not drink the water in Marah because of its bitterness, Moses called out to the Lord: "... he cried to the Lord; and the Lord showed him a tree, and he threw it into the water, and the water became sweet" (Ex 15:23-25). The wood that we throw into the bitter water is the word "Amen": it is good as it is, and it was good even then, because you, O God, were there. God was there. That is the very first and most important thing that our

reading of the Scriptures can teach us: God is there in everything that happens. In the Bible we are dealing with the first cause, not the second. The most dramatic event in Joseph's life, when his brothers sold him, was God's greatest grace. "God sent me before you", he says to his brothers who came to Egypt to buy grain, "to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God" (Gen 45:7-8). "You meant evil against me; but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today" (Gen 50:20). Into Your Hands Father by Fr. A Week of (two) Feast Days!

Because March 19 falls on a Sunday this year, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, is transferred to and celebrated on Monday, March 20th. This is a day of joyful remembering, since St. Joseph was a prayerful and loving husband to Mary and foster father to Jesus. We thank him for his prayers for us, and his universal patronage of the Church. May we all celebrate the gift he was and is, and implore his prayerful intercession.

The Incarnation Is Our Hope . . .

. . and so we celebrate the Solemnity of the Annunciation. In the heart of this Lenten season, we recall that March 25, nine months before Christmas, is when our hope for salvation came to earth. This coming Saturday, we remember and celebrate the "Yes" of Mary, the young maiden, who conformed her will to that of the Father in heaven. Mary said, "Be it done to me according to your word." And it was. She conceived by the Holy Spirit, and became the Mother of Hope, the Mother of Mercy, the Mother of Jesus, the Mother of God! What a great gift it is to remember the joy of the Incarnation as we anticipate the culmination of Christ's life on earth, his Passion, Death, and Resurrection.
