Rejoice!

This, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is called by that name because of the beginning of the opening antiphon for today's Mass: "Laetare Jerusalem," which is translated, "Rejoice, Jerusalem!" And we do rejoice. We are at the midway point of this season of penance, looking forward to the celebration of the holiest week of the Christian year. Just as we do the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday), today the priest wears "Rose" vestments. Let us, indeed, be joyful that we are sons and daughters of God through our baptism.

The Prodigal Son

This weekend, we hear the powerful parable of the Prodigal Son. It offers a poignant glimpse into the prodigal mercy of God. Forgiveness and reconciliation is the offer God makes to us and to all those whom we love. Not a few of you have children or grandchildren or other family members about whom you are concerned. As a word of encouragement, let me offer these reflections from someone who addressed a group of parents of lost (or we might say prodigal) children:

When I hear from heartbroken parents of Prodigal Sons, I urge them to think of the tears and prayers of the mother of Saint Dismas. Saint Dismas is the "Good Thief", the one to whom Jesus said, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Lk 23:43). Now we don't know who that is, but I imagine she often went to the temple, beseeching God for her son's salvation. She must have been like Saint Monica, weeping and praying for the salvation of Saint Augustine. Could the mother of Saint Dismas have known what Divine Providence had in store for her? The very source of her pain and sorrow—her son's wayward ways—became the vehicle by which salvation would come to her son. Imagine that for a moment. Think about it. Little did she know that the path to her son's salvation was a literal cross, and that her son had a divine appointment with the incarnate Son of God. We can say with confidence that the most important moment in his life was the day he was crucified with Our Lord—and in God's remarkable manner of working all things for good, for those called according to his purpose as we read in Romans 8:28, the second most important moment in St. Dismas's life was the crime he committed that sent him to the cross, to be crucified next to Jesus. St. Gregory of Nazianzus wrote about a despicable character, a man who used to engage in sorcery to try to get women into bed with him—a man, who is now a saint, St. Cyprian of Antioch—St. Gregory of Naziansus wrote this, "The

divine wisdom knows how to lay the foundations of great events far in advance and to use opposites to produce opposites in order to rouse even greater wonderment." St. Dismas is now in heaven, no doubt singing God's praises with his mother who shed so many tears for him and for his salvation. Today, I'm certain they rejoice at the throne of Jesus, who says, "Behold, I make all things new". Cling to hope for your Prodigal Son, never giving into despair, always saying, "Jesus, I trust in you." In your hope, always remember how the story ends, with a feast, and the fatted calf who was. What can we learn from that? Well, one thing—the calf was fattened up while the Prodigal Son was gone. The Father continued living his life at home, caring for his servants, caring for the elder son, sowing and harvesting Cling to hope, always trusting in God, trusting that you will be in awe and wonder at the remarkable story of your child's homecoming God's timing is always the right time—and rarely is that timing ours. In the fullness of time. In the fullness of time, trust that Father will bring your Prodigal Son (or Daughter) home.

The eager anticipation of the Father, the loving desire for return, is the movement of love from God for each of us and all those we love. Each of us knows what it is to be prodigal at one time or another. We, like the Prodigal, should come to our senses and return to the Father, whenever and however many times we fall or wander away. Indeed, the further we run (the same applies to those we love) the more glorious will be the celebration upon our (or their) return. Such is the great gift of God's prodigal (seemingly wasteful) mercy and love. That mercy is on offer all the time to each and every one of the baptized. Keep on praying, trusting, waiting for the Lord to call all his children home . . . in the fullness of time.

Confession is Good for the Soul

As a priest, I am grateful for the opportunity that the Lord has given me to serve the faithful in and through the sacrament of reconciliation. I am committed to offering confession often, and want to encourage everyone to take time this Lent to go to confession. Each Advent and Lent there is an opportunity for our city-wide communal penance services. I will be helping out this Sunday at 1:30 p.m. at St. Thomas. As always, there will be a good number of priests to hear your confession. We will have another communal penance service at St. Therese on Tuesday, April 8th at 7:00 p.m. If it's been a while since you were last at confession, don't rob yourself or those you love of the grace of forgiveness. The Lord allows us to begin again when we go to confession. Among the best reasons for rejoicing on this *Laetare* Sunday is that the Lord is kind and merciful.


