Surrendering and Suffering to Gain Christ

The importance of suffering, and joining our suffering to that of Jesus, is a fundamental aspect of our Catholic Christian faith. You may recall this from St. Paul's <u>Letter to the</u> Colossians:

Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the church, of which I am a minister in accordance with God's stewardship given to me to bring to completion for you the word of God, the mystery hidden from ages and from generations past. But now it has been manifested to his holy ones, to whom God chose to make known the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; it is Christ in you, the hope for glory. (Col. 1:24-27).

St. Paul rejoices in his sufferings, because as he joins them to the suffering of Christ, the Lord is at work on behalf of the Church. The goal of all his strivings and those of Christ is our salvation, the mystery of which, he continues is "Christ in you, the hope for glory." Your suffering and mine, and the suffering of those we love—when it is united to that of Christ—is redemptive; salvific. Such "embraced suffering" has a transformative effect in ways that we can only rarely see here below. When Judgment Day comes, we will see how all our suffering has contributed to the redemptive work of Jesus.

St. Paul, who suffered much, offers us a glimpse of our future glory. Because he can see clearly the spiritual realities of this life, he wrote letters to the Colossians and to the Philippians, which address the mystery of suffering. Today's second reading, from St. Paul's Letter to the <u>Philippians</u>, contains powerful words that challenge us to dare to believe that eternal things are really the most important. It is counter-intuitive. We are prone (naturally) to focus on the seen more than the unseen, but the Lord, through the Holy Spirit, longs for us to believe, to see, and to live, as if the unseen—the spiritual—were really the most important aspect of our lives and the world. It is souls and hearts that matter most. St. Paul, having heard from Jesus at his conversion and having seen the Holy Spirit work, invites us to see as he saw, and to live as he lived. St. Paul made a choice about how he would view things, and having such a change of mind (of how to see) would serve us as well. Let's explore this text together:

I consider everything as a loss because of the supreme good of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have accepted the loss of all things and I consider them so much rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in him . . Knowing Christ Jesus as Lord is the supreme good for St. Paul. He sees more clearly than you and I see. That's why he can be a great guide for us. Frankly, it is not easy for most of us to hold the truth of what St. Paul says (i.e., knowing Christ Jesus my Lord is the supreme good) clearly in mind as we grapple with all the important (not to mention the myriad mundane) things in life. Even so, the Lord wants us grow in faith so that, like St. Paul, we can increasingly see everything in its proper, eternal, perspective.

... not having any righteousness of my own based on the law but that which <u>comes through faith in Christ</u>, the righteousness from God, depending on faith <u>to know him and</u> the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by being conformed to his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

We don't earn our salvation. Instead, we become righteous by grace through (obedient) faith, as we live out the Christian life. Our life in Christ is supposed to be marked by the *power of his resurrection*, the power of the Holy Spirit. It is precisely in times of suffering that we can become more fully conformed to his death. St. Paul seems to be saying that if we don't *share his sufferings*, are not *conformed to his death*, we may not *attain the resurrection from the dead*. The latter (resurrection and future glory) seems predicated on the willing joining of our suffering to Christ's and the dying to ourselves in obedience and emulation of Jesus. Even so, St. Paul makes very clear that this is something that we strive for, it's not a one-time decision. His life was (and ours is) a work in progress:

. . It is not that I have already taken hold of it or have already attained perfect maturity, but I continue my pursuit in hope that I may possess it, since I have indeed been taken possession of by Christ Jesus. Brothers and sisters, I for my part do not consider myself to have taken possession. Just one thing: forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead, I continue my pursuit toward the goal, the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 3:8-14). Let us strive to emulate St. Paul, straining forward to what lies ahead . . . toward the goal . . Heaven!

I know well that many of you are suffering very much indeed and/or are concerned about - loved ones who are suffering very much indeed. The Lord invites you and me, and all those who suffer, to take advantage of the suffering, which, as St. Paul does, to consider suffering through the lens of God's love, and as a way for each of us to become more like Christ and for each of us to "fill up what is lacking in Christ's sufferings" for the sake of the Church, just as St. Paul did. As we suffer, we can be tempted to numb the pain or reject the goodness of God. But, what's better, and let's attempt to do it, is to strive, prayerfully and obediently to join our sufferings to his. One day, we will see just what God accomplished because we chose to suffer through, with, and in Him.

Confession is Good for the Soul

As a priest, I am grateful for the opportunity that the Lord has given me to serve the faithful in and through the sacrament of reconciliation. I am committed to offering confession often, and want to encourage everyone to take time this Lent to go to confession. Each Advent and Lent there are opportunities for communal penance services. As there was last week at St. Thomas, there will be a communal penance service this afternoon at 2:30 p.m., this time at St. Gerard. Note that we will also have a communal penance service at St. Therese on Tuesday, April 8th at 7:00 p.m. If it's been a while since you were last at confession, don't rob yourself or those you love of the grace of forgiveness. The Lord allows us to begin again when we go to confession.




