

The peaceful prayer event will be held from 2:30-3:30 this afternoon, asking God to bless our efforts to promote the sanctity of all human life.

Living the (Digital) Free(r) Life

After a frustrating period of being unable to activate my Light Phone 3, I met with success, and am now "smart phone-free" for about a week and a half. The first few days, I kept my iPhone (using wifi) because of its intuitive and convenient alarm clock, easy podcast listening, helpful apps for things like finding the cheapest fuel, getting the weather forecast, and checking, wherever I might be, updates on Microsoft Teams. Those first few days, I remained half-tethered to my iPhone. Last Saturday morning, during my holy hour, I realized that it was foolhardy to keep the iPhone as a wifi-only tablet of sorts.

I proverbially cut the cord. No more iPhone, no more Remarkable 2, no more Apple Watch. I did so because I didn't want to be constantly connected anymore. Paul Kingsnorth observes, in his book *Against the Machine* (more about which below), that our devices connect to *the web* or *the net*. He wryly notes that those words *describe devices designed to catch prey*. And caught we are. No?

I half feel the need to apologize for continuing to talk about this, but I can no longer unsee what I have seen happening around me, and within myself. Seeing and reading what this technology is doing to us and especially our children has sobered me. We "moderns" have slowly, steadily, clicked and swiped our way into slavery to our devices. The devices were designed just that way. They offer us (especially with advent of AI) anything and everything we might want to know or could imagine. No need to say "no" to anything.

After I got my "smart watch," I found myself checking things I never knew I should care about, such as my heart rate variation! These devices offer more and more and more and more things we should and can know, and the more they offer, the more we "need them." And the more we need them, the more we use them. Perhaps it would be better to say that the more we use them, *the more they use us*.

The amount of time people spend using devices keeps growing, which is why we need to set limits. The designers of the devices created them so that users will give their attention more often and for longer. And too many of us too readily comply.

I don't want to serve the Machine anymore, which is why I need to disconnect, to unplug, to live more (if not most) of my life free of the web, the net, the trap of technology. It's not possible to be entirely free—would that it were!—but I know that less technology is better for me, and I suspect that's true for you. I am positive that less tech is better for our children.

The Anxious Generation

Many of you may be familiar with Jonathan Haidt's *The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood Is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness.* It is definitely worth your time and attention. It reviews scientific research, and describes the interpersonal and psychological consequences of the adoption of the smart phone. The ill-effects on (especially) children are huge. The Men's Wednesday Morning Breakfast (6:30 to 7:30 a.m.) in Mercy Hall began reading this book this past Wednesday. If you're free on Wednesdays, men, consider joining them. Paul Kingsnorth's New Book

In some of my (newly found) free time, I started reading Paul Kingsnorth's new book, Against the Machine: On the Unmaking of Humanity. It sounds dystopian, to be sure, but Kingsnorth is a prophet for our times. Here's the blurb for the book on his website: Against the Machine is an account of the technological-cultural matrix enveloping all of us. The culmination of two decades of my writing and thinking about technology, culture, spirituality and politics, it seeks to offer an insight into how the techno-industrial culture that I call 'the Machine' has choked Western civilization, is destroying the Earth itself, and is reshaping us all in its image.

From the First Industrial Revolution to the rise of artificial intelligence, this book shows how the hollowing out of humanity has been a long game—and how our very soul is now at stake. Against the Machine is the spiritual manual for dissidents in the Technological age. Kingsnorth has been paying attention to the dangers of technology for a long time, and his observations are sobering. I can't wait to get to his prescription for the way forward! Let's pray for each other, and find ways to steadily disconnect for the sake of our minds, souls, and hearts. And, especially, those of our children!

2025 Life Chain—Sunday, October 5th






Stewardship for Saints and Scholars


