The Church strongly encourages people to receive the Sacrament (Anointing) of the Sick at the early stages of serious sickness or before serious surgeries.

MARRIAGE

Archdiocesan law requires advance notice of at least six months.

Last December 8, Pope Francis proclaimed a "Year of St. Joseph" until Dec. 8, 2021, commemorating the 150th Last December 8, Pope Francis proclaimed a "Year of St. Joseph" until Dec. 8, 2021, commemorating the 150th anniversary of the declaration of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church.

In his encyclical letter, Patris Corde ("With a Father's Heart"), reminds us of the acceptance that was consistent of St. Jospeh in his life. That acceptance to God's will, is something that can help all of us in our lives.

The Holy Father wrote this letter as the Covid-19 pandemic was in full force. The pandemic helps us to clearly see the many people who resemble St. Jospeh who exercised patience every day, like St. Jospeh, and also offered hope, like St. Joseph, who remain out of the spotlight, do their work unnoticed every day with a discreet and hidden presence.

St. Joseph was a tender, beloved and obedient father. Even when he really didn't know what was being asked of him, he was obedient to God's will. He trusted in God. He also showed us creative courage as he dealt with the difficulties he faced. He can relate with all those people who have to get up and move their family multiple times! St. Joseph also teaches us the value, dignity and joy of work. He worked, using the skills God give him, and provided for his family.

Joseph certainly focused his life on Mary and Jesus. He was not the center of things and knew what his role was. Pope Francis says, "fathers are not born, but made. A man does not become a father simply by bringing a child into the world, but by taking up the responsibility to care for the that child." Yes, we can learn so much from St. Joseph.

Come Home to Hope **General Dispensation Lifted as of March 13**

Beginning Saturday afternoon, March 13, 2021, the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is reinstated for the Archdiocese of Detroit, Considering the grave obligation we have to be physically present with our brothers and sisters on Sunday and Holy Day, each of us is asked to make a good and sincere judgement as to whether the following circumstances apply or not.

While the *general dispensation* is removed, there are specific instances where the dispensation will continue, as well as those circumstances where there is no obligation in the first place, One does not have an obligation to attend Mass on Sunday and Holy Days in the following circumstances and can have a personal dispensation:

- 1. You are will or your health would be significantly compromised if you were to contract a communicable illness. Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass,
- 2. You exhibit flu-like symptoms. *Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass*,
- 3. You have good reason to think you might be asymptomatic of a contagious illness (e.g., you were in recent contact with someone who tested positive for an illness. Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass,
- 4. You care for the sick, homebound, or infirmed,
- 5. You are pregnant.
- 6. Those y65 years of age or older (per the CDC recommendations for high risk people)
- 7. You cannot attend Mass through no fault of your own (e.g., no Mass is offered, you are infirmed, wanting to go you were prevented for some reason behind your control (e.g., your ride did not show up, the church reached its capacity)).
- 8. If you have *significant* fear or anxiety of becoming ill by being at Mass.

[These categories will be reviewed in due course and revised as needed.]

Those within categories #1-8 above must still observe the Lord's Day and are encouraged to spend time in prayer in Scripture, meditating on the Lord's passion death and resurrection.







A Guide for Confession

Begin your confession with the sign of the cross, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Bless me Father for I have sinned....it has been _____ weeks (months, years) since my last confession.

Say the sins that you remember. Start with the one(s) that is most difficult to say. After confessing all the sins you remember since your last good confession, you may conclude by saying, "I am sorry for these and all the sins of my past life."

Listen to the words of the priest. He will assign you some penance. Doing the penance will diminish the temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven. When invited, express some prayer of sorrow or Act of Contrition such as:

An Act of Contrition

(two similar Acts of Contrition are posted in the Confessional)

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended you and I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell. But most of all because I have offended you, my God, who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve with the help of your grace, to confess my sins, to do penance and to amend my life.

Amen.

At the End of Confession

Listen to the words of absolution, the sacramental forgiveness of the Church through the ordained priest.

As you listen to the words of forgiveness, make the sign of the cross with the priest.



Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to your protection, implored your help or sought your intercession, was left unaided.


