When was the last time you participated in one of the primary liturgies of the Church's year – the liturgies of the Paschal Triduum? Five years? Ten? Forty? Maybe never? Why not make the commitment to participate in one this year.

Lent ends at the start of the Mass on Thursday night as the "Paschal Triduum" begins. Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday are different than all other days in the Church's year, e.g., funeral Masses are not permitted these days. The liturgies we celebrate are all different than the normal liturgies we experience. In essence, they are to be looked at as one complete liturgy though divided over three days. Let's take a look at each one of them.

Holy Thursday: (Remember there is no mornina Mass and the Blessed Sacrament will be removed from the tabernacle around 8:00 am. The Prayer chapel will also close at that time...a good time for us to also do some cleaning.) There is only **one** Mass on Holy Thursday and that is the "Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper." Holy water is removed and the church begins to be rather bare and simple. The Sacred Oils, blessed earlier that day at the Cathedral, will be presented for use in this parish. At this Mass we commemorate the institution of the Eucharist, the institution of the priesthood and Christ's commandment to love all our brothers and sisters. There are generally two distinctive features or actions at this Mass. Following the homily, we do what was just heard in the Gospel, i.e., feet are washed. The presider washes the feet of twelve selected people following the example of Jesus. This is a reminder to all of our call to serve each other in charity and with love. As a further extension of this call, those who are present are asked to bring up their Lenten Alms during the presentation of the aifts. At this Mass, we also consecrate enough bread or hosts for communion on Good Friday. Following communion, the Blessed Sacrament remains on the altar and then carried in procession to a place of reposition. For us, we process to The Pointe where the Blessed Sacrament will remain until 11 pm. All are invited to come and pray during this time.. The



church is then quietly stripped. After 11pm, the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the sacristy, and not the tabernacle in church, until the Easter Vigil.

Good Friday: The official liturgy of the Church this day is the "Celebration of the Passion of the Lord" and consists of three parts. (Stations of the Cross is a popular devotion prayed by many this day but it is not the official prayer of the day.) At the appointed time (1:30 pm here at Star) the ministers enter in silence and everyone kneels. . After standing, the opening prayer is prayed. The Liturgy of the Word consists of two readings and then the reading of the passion from John's gospel. After the homily, we have the General Intercessions, i.e., ten intercessions praying for the members of the Church as well as those who do not believe in God. The second part of this liturgy is the Veneration of the Cross. Here our focus is on a cross, not a crucifix, the instrument of our salvation. The whole church comes to venerate the cross either by a genuflection, a touch or a kiss. The third part of the liturgy is Holy Communion. As this is not a Mass, we now distribute the Blessed Sacrament that was consecrated at the previous evening. Following communion and a short prayer, all the ministers and people exit in silence.

Holy Saturday: (Remember there is no 4 pm Mass this day.) On this day the church is still stark and empty. The day and night is one of vigil for the Lord. The liturgy of the whole year is "The Easter Vigil." It begins after sunset and darkness sets (8:30 pm this year) and consists of four parts. The first part is the Service of Light. The church is totally dark and we begin is a simple introduction as a fire is lit



and then blessed. The new Easter or Paschal Candle is prepared, lit and then carried in procession through the dark church as "Christ our Light" is proclaimed three times. The Easter Proclamation (Exsultet) is sung amidst the flickering candlelight. The second part of the Easter Viail is the Lituray of the Word. Here a number of readings are proclaimed, the Gloria is once again sung as well as the Alleluia. Part three is the Liturgy of Baptism and one of the real highlights of the night. Here we bless new water, initiate any new members of the Church through baptism and confirmation, and then together we all renew our baptismal promises. The fourth part is the usual Liturgy of the Eucharist when we receive the great gift of Jesus himself in His Body and Blood. Then we finally conclude the Easter Vigil with the sign of the cross and dismissal, going forth to bring the Light of Christ to the world.

Now don't be afraid to come to church for any or all of these liturgies! We highly encourage you to attend. They truly are the most beautiful liturgies of the Church's year. Hopefully the above explanation gives you a clearer idea as to what will happen during those liturgies.

** Usually on Palm Sunday and Easter there are many people who return "home" to church or who have not been present for a period of time. We pray that the Lord will continue to stir the flame of faith in you. We also pray that you will continue to join us in the future.

- ** When people get new palms they often wonder what to do with the old. Do not throw them in the garbage. Since they are blessed, they should be burned or buried. The simplest thing is to cut them up in small pieces and bury them in the garden.
- ** Please be attentive to the schedule for Saturday and Sunday. Remember: there is no 4 pm Mass on Saturday.
- ** This year we will have a **reception** after the Easter Vigil in The Pointe! We celebrate with Easter joy as we break-fast together. This will be a potluck event! The parish will provide some refreshments, I might bake some brownies or something, and I ask anyone who is coming to the Vigil and wants to participate in the reception to simply bring your item (a dessert, deviled eggs, cakes, cookies, etc.) to The Pointe before the Vigil begins. It will be great to see what we get!!
- ** The SERF vicariate will gather at 1 pm for a penance service Monday at St. Pio Church and 7 pm at St. Joan of Arc church. As Pope Francis has asked in a general audience recently: When was the last time you went to confession? Two weeks ago? Two years ago? Twenty years ago? Forty? Whatever it is, it is too long. Remember you are confessing to Christ and He is full of mercy, waiting to give it to us.
- ** Thanks to all who came to the parish Fish Frys this year. Many thanks to the great volunteers who worked these wonderful events for the good of the parish!

May this week truly be holy for you. Please take the time to pause, reflect and spend some time with our Lord and the Church.





Kingdom Kids

Our Kingdom Kids program is held during the 9:30 a.m. Mass on Sundays throughout the school year with variety of activities that teach our 3 year olds through Kindergarteners about God's great love for them. This year's theme is

For the Lenten season, the

Kingdom Kids have been writing their prayers on the Easter Tree every week when they come to class, sharing their prayers and intentions for others.

On Palm Sunday, the children will be a part of the procession at the start of Mass and will then return to the class room to take part in a "Walk Through Holy Week" - experiencing what it was like for Our Lord to ride through Jerusalem on a donkey; taste the Last Supper; see the empty tomb; and experience the JOY of Easter morning. Come check us out!



Holy Week is almost upon us, which means Lent is almost over and Easter is almost here! When Lent began, you probably found yourself thinking about what you could do to be better persons or looking for ways to add more meaning to your life.

As parents, you probably also tried to prepare your family for the Lenten season. Here are some suggestions on how you can teach your kids about Holy Week and Easter:



- 1. Explain the significance of each day of Holy Week to them and tell them that the entire week, starting with Palm Sunday and Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, is a time to remember the passion and death of Jesus, and that Easter Sunday is a day of great rejoicing. You can also say that counting down the days to Easter Sunday is similar to counting down the days to Christmas. Focus more on the beauty and joy of Easter, rather than Jesus' suffering and death, so that the kids will feel like they have something to look forward to.
- 2. Read the Bible passages that correspond to the events of Holy Week to your children. If your kids are still young, use a children's Bible that has pictures and simplifies the stories.
- 3. On Holy Thursday, explain to your kids the symbolism behind the washing of the feet (i.e. Jesus came to serve and not to be served; to show His love for us). You may want to do your own "washing of the feet" activity in your own home.
- 4. On Good Friday, bring your kids to church to pray the Stations of the Cross with them.
- 5. On Holy Saturday, take time as a family to reflect about the importance of having Jesus with us and to prepare for the joys of Easter Sunday. Bring the makings for your Easter dinner to the parish for the special blessing of the food at noon.
- 6. On Easter Sunday, join your parish community celebration of Easter by attending Mass as a family. Later in the day have a big Easter celebration in honor of Jesus' Resurrection.

Everyone likes to achieve a victory whether it is in games, sports, elections, or some other activity. Victories may hold certain rewards or recognition and are often associated with lots of preparation and hard work.

There are various symbols of victory, such as the letter "V" or a "W" for a win. Nations have long had symbols of military victory. In pre-Christian times, palms were used to symbolize joy and victories.

Beginning Holy Week today with "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord", we use palms to commemorate Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. In Mark 11:8, we hear that "Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut from the fields."

In doing so, the people honored Him as their King. Just think about the excitement and joy of that day as they called out "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." (Mark 11:9)

Yet, Pope Francis has said our celebration today can be called "bittersweet" because we not only celebrate Christ's triumphal entry

into Jerusalem, but we read the Passion according to Mark.

"In this poignant contrast, our hearts experience in some small measure what Jesus himself must have felt in his own heart that day, as he rejoiced with his friends and wept over Jerusalem." (Pope Francis)

The Passion tells us about Christ's lasting victory – a victory over sin and death, a victory that would be understood later. This led to the early Christians using palms as a symbol of this victory.

This victory is for all of us and one we should celebrate every day.

Yes, there is still the preparation and hard work we need to do to achieve our personal victory. However, we know it is within our reach.

Because God loves us so much, He has given us the Holy Spirit to help and guide us. We should be sure to take advantage of this special gift.




"America and Me" Essay Contest Winners
