



Good and gracious God,



For some of us today is a mixed bag of emotions. We hurt deeply for those who lost their lives and those who lost their loved ones. We mourn the nearly 3,000 who died that day. We are humbled by the bravery of the first responders.

Fr Jeremy Davis will be here the Weekend of September 11-12 Please help support his Mission



Hello! My name is Fr. Jeremy Davis, S.O.L.T. and I've had the privilege of serving at Santa Maria del Mexicano for six years. For over 40 years Santa Maria has been a home and a family to the poor, disadvantaged, neglected and abandoned youth of Mexico. The mission also includes a home for the elderly who come from challenging life situations.

Santa Maria is served by my religious community: the Society of Our Lady of the Most Holy Trinity (S.O.L.T.). I serve as the assistant director of the institution and as the director of the house for the middle school and high school boys. Santa Maria is a private, Catholic institution that offers elementary, middle school, and high school education to children without any resources or options. Our children learn vocational skills and some are even offered the opportunity to study in college.

Witnessing God's goodness in these children and sharing the person of Jesus Christ with them are my greatest joys. Their traumatic life experiences cannot stifle or suppress God's goodness in them. Our heavenly Father preserves their innocence and reveals it in their smiles. Praying with them, offering Mass for them, teaching them, accompanying them to the doctor, teaching them soccer, cutting their hair have become the beautiful gifts to me that form us in the family of God. Each day these children teach me to be a disciple, a dad, and a spiritual father. Thank you for being part of our family.

Speak among yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual canticles, singing and reciting psalms to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks always for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to God the Father. (Ephesians 5: 19, 20)

One of the many things I enjoy most about music ministry is hymnody, studying and praying the content message of hymns, exploring the resources of hymnbooks and learning more about specific hymns, their background, their authors and composers and what inspired them, as well as to see how they have evolved across the centuries and how texts and tunes themselves are even altered from book to book.

I'm an avid collector of hymnbooks and hymn collections. Having most recently had to pack my old office I was reminded yet again of how much I've accumulated across the span of my career in church music. Heaven help the person that ultimately will inherit my collection! I suppose one can describe me as being a hymn geek.

Exploring and learning more about the music we sing in liturgy as an assembly will be a recurring theme of these columns, something which I hope will edify and enrich your spiritual lives.

Our opening hymn today, "Praise, my soul, the King of heaven" is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 103. What is a metrical paraphrase? A metrical paraphrase is when an author (or rather, a poet) takes a scripture text (often times a psalm) and recasts it into a specific metric form, meaning that each line is a consistently recurring number of syllables to allow for the text to be attached most easily to a tune. In the case of this hymn, the number of syllables of the verses of each stanza is 8 in the first line, 7 in the second, 8 in the third, 7 in the fourth, 8 in the fifth, and 7 and in the sixth. For the most part hymn texts are written independently from their tunes, so when one is trying to match up a text with a tune all one has to do is look for tunes which have a matching number of notes in each of its phrases to coincide with that of the verses (the term is called "poetic meter") of the text. Many hymnals and sacred song collections actually have what is called a metrical index, where tunes are organized accordingly. Yes, this is all very academic, but from a hymn and songwriters perspective it is invaluable.

Just because a tune has the same number of notes as the same number of syllables of a text doesn't mean that it is a good match for the text, as just as a tune has a high point and a low point with its melody, so too does a poetic text have a high point or high points and low points, words that are more important than others which need to be emphasized.

A case in point is our opening hymn (number 684 in *Ritual Song*) and notice how the word "Alleluia" is repeated towards the very end of each stanza, and notice how the notes for this word start at the top of the musical scale and descend, and then they are repeated for emphasis. This moment in the hymn is the climax of each stanza! The word "Alleluia" or "Hallelujah" is a transliteration of the Hebrew phrase of which the first part ("All-le") means to praise *Jah* (from the Hebrew word for "praise"), *hallel* (from the Hebrew word for "joyous praise in song"), and the second part, *Yah*, is a shortened form of YHWH, or Yahweh in modern English, the Hebrew name for God, the Creator – all the more reason for the tune to be a fitting match to this great text. Of course the word "alleluia" needs to be raised up melodically!

One of the things which is especially rich about this hymn text is the breadth of its message from stanza to stanza, how it, as it unfolds, speaks of God's abiding care and love through thick and thin, of our mortality (stanza 4), culminating in the final stanza with the angels and all creation singing praise to God.

- 1. Praise, my soul, the King of heaven; to his feet your tribute bring.
 Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, evermore his praises sing.
 Alleluia, alleluia!
 Praise the everlasting King!
- 2. Praise him for his grace and favor to his people in distress.
 Praise him, still the same as ever, slow to chide, and swift to bless.
 Alleluia, alleluia!
 Glorious in his faithfulness!
- 3. Fatherlike he tends and spares us; well our feeble frame he knows. In his hand he gently bears us,

rescues us from all our foes. Alleluia, alleluia! Widely yet his mercy flows!

- 4. Frail as summer's flower we flourish, blows the wind and it is gone; but while mortals rise and perish God endures unchanging on. Alleluia, alleluia!

 Praise the High, Eternal One.
- 5. Angels, help us to adore him; you behold him face to face.
 Sun and moon, bow down before him, dwellers all in time and space.
 Alleluia, alleluia!
 Praise with us the God of grace!

Not only is this hymn a fitting way to focus our thoughts and hearts as we begin our worship, but it alludes to the care shown by Jesus in today's Gospel lesson. While this hymn was written almost two centuries ago (1834, to be exact) using as its basis a Psalm that wæ written thousands of years ago, it still speaks to us in our own time and place and all that unfolds in our lives.

So as we are reminded in Ephesians 5: 19 and 20, may all that we sing among our selves "in psalms and hymns and spiritual canticles" before the Throne of Grace give "thanks always for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to God the Father."






