For over 40 years Santa Maria has been a home and a family to the poor, disadvantaged, neglected and abandoned youth of Mexico. The mission also includes a home for the elderly who come from challenging

life situations.

Santa Maria is served by my religious community: the Society of Our Lady of the Most Holy Trinity (S.O.L.T.). I serve as the assistant director of the institution and as the director of the house for the middle school and high school boys. Santa Maria is a private, Catholic institution that offers elementary, middle school, and high school education to children without any resources or options. Our children learn vocational skills and some are even offered the opportunity to study in college.

Witnessing God's goodness in these children and sharing the person of Jesus Christ with them are my greatest joys. Their traumatic life experiences cannot stifle or suppress God's goodness in them. Our heavenly

Father preserves their innocence and reveals it in their smiles. Praying with them, offering Mass for them, teaching them, accompanying them to the doctor, teaching them soccer, cutting their hair have become the beautiful gifts to me that form us in the family of God. Each day these children teach me to be a disciple, a dad, and a spiritual father. Thank you for being part of our family.

God of understanding, overwhelmed by the magnitude of this tragedy, we seek your light and guidance as we confront such terrible events.


Grant that those whose lives were spared may live so that the lives lost here may not have been lost in vain.

# GATHER UNDER THE STARS:

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MUMS



What's in a (tune) name? Did you know that the tunes of hymns and worship songs have names separate from the titles they have which come from their texts?

There's a story behind not only the texts of hymns, but also behind the tunes that are sung with them, and the stories really run the gamut but are nonetheless enlightening.

Tune names are listed either at the bottom of the page (as is the case in or red hymnal, *RitualSong*), or at the top of the page on the right (as is the case in *Spirit and Song*), in capital letters.

So what's the point in giving names to tunes in the first place, and how did this practice come into existence? The point is actually a very practical one, as by giving a tune a specific name separate from the title of the hymn from the derived from the text it frees it from being wedded solely to a specific text. By giving the tune a specific name it becomes readily identifiable to authors and musicians. The names given to tunes are drawn from just about anything, such as the name of a geographical place, something used in the liturgy, the name of a person, or even something that is significant from or connected to its origin.

Let's consider today's opening hymn, no. 884 in RitualSong, "Lift high the cross." The tune for this rousing hymn is named CRUCIFER. What's a crucifer? A crucifer is the person who carries the cross at the head of an liturgical procession. This tune was actually composed for this text, a text which calls us to "Lift high the cross" and proclaim the love of Christ in all the world, and how each Christian, in their baptism, are sealed with the sign of the cross, the seal of Him who died. The text dates from 1887 when it was written for use at a Society for the Propagation of the Gospel Festival in Winchester Cathedral, England. The tune however was composed for this text in 1916, and together they became an alternative to the hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers," a hymn which was particularly popular during World War I. What gives this hymn its particular strength is that after each stanza we have a refrain, "Lift high the cross," and it is only natural that each time we come to the refrain we sing it with more gusto. Note too how the tune supports the primary words of the refrain – "cross," "world," and "adore" – by giving these words longer note values, and how the composer does something called "text painting," where he has a higher note for the word "high" and, to emphasize the word "world" he uses the same high note. In its original form the text has twelve (!) stanzas, some of which (not included in hymnbooks today) get very intense theologically in the spiritual battle between good and evil, and how through the Cross the power of Satan is vanquished. It is only natural that in a time of war (World War I) that this hymn came into common use. Winchester Cathedral is actually the longest cathedral in England, so one can easily imagine they needed all twelve stanzas to simply get the procession from the back to the front of the church. The tune name (SHAKER SONG) for our closing hymn, "Lord of the Dance," (Spirit and Song, no. 128) directly comes from the community and tradition of its origin, the Shakers. Who were the Shakers? Today they are best remembered for their simple architecture and finely crafted furniture (a precursor to the Arts and Crafts movement of the early twentieth century) but they were actually a Christian sect founded in 1747 in England which because of persecution came to the United States in the 1780's, forming communities in upstate New York and New England. Their name, Shakers, came from their ecstatic behavior during worship services. Their music reflected a rugged, simple style, and in the twentieth century, because of its simple American ethos, caught the attention of major American composers who sought to develop art music (orchestral, chamber, and vocal) that paid homage to the folk music of America. Most notably, this tune plays a very prominent role in Aaron Copland's ballet, Appalachian Spring. This tune became wedded to this text in 1963 when its author, Sydney Carter wrote this hymn which traces the life of Christ, drawing from a catechetical tradition which began in the Middle Ages in religious plays where the stories of the Faith are taught in a direct manner. In this hymn Carter begins with the Creation and then goes directly to the life and ministry of Christ, through the Crucifixion and culminating in the Resurrection and the life that Christ brings. While Carter's text and the tune have on the surface a rather light touch, what lies beneath the surface is a lot of profound theological insight. Like our opening hymn with its refrain, this hymn too has a refrain, which is easily memorized and often times becomes lodged, for good reason, in one's memory. Continued on next page


