Much has gone on the past few years that has changed our lives. The pandemic has turned our lives around and upside down in many ways. We do some things today differently in our personal life, our family life, and our work life then we did 2 or 3 years ago

Some of the changes we are experiencing in our local Church started to change a few years prior to that during the

Archdiocesan Synod '16. After a year of prayer to the Holy Spirit, Synod '16 set our local Church of Detroit on a different path and direction, i.e., more outward-focused and mission oriented than inward-focused and maintenance. As with any establishment, a shift in focus, direction and mission usually involves a shift in structure and ways of doing things.

Besides the pandemic creating a pause in the traditional way and operations in parish life, there is also the reality of the growing shortage of clergy and church ministers. In the next 5 years, the Archdiocese of Detroit is expected to have 40 fewer priests. In ten years from now, 100 fewer priests ministering in the Archdiocese. This year, for the first time in 70 years, the Archdiocese will not be ordaining anyone to the priesthood. This shortage has also accelerated the need to change our approach in serving and ministering within the Archdiocese.

I have mentioned here over the past two years about "family of parishes." This is the direction the Archdiocese is taking in response to these challenges and transform into being a missionary Church. Archbishop Vigneron describes it this way: "A Family of Parishes is a grouping of three or more parishes that collaborate in deeper and more intentional ways than parishes have ever done before. Each parish in a Family will retain its own unique identity, similar to how each sibling has his or her own unique role in the family. This is not a parish cluster or merger as we have done in the past. Rather, Families of Parishes share similarities to other models that have been successfully implemented in other dioceses in the United States and Canada, with new parish structures to support mission. … These new Families of Parishes will collaborate by sharing resources — including priests, deacons, and staffs across parish lines — to further advance the mission Christ has entrusted to his Church." (Pastoral Note on Family of Parishes.)

Half of the Archdiocese is already ministering as family of parishes. Star of the Sea begins this July 1. Our "family" includes St. Lucy, St. Joan of Arc, St. Veronica, and St. Basil parishes. We are the family in the central part of our Vicariate. The family "north" of us is comprised of St. Pio, St. Margaret, Holy Innocents, St. Isaac Jocques, and Our Lady of Hope parishes. The family on the south end of our vicariate is St. Ambrose, St. Clare of Montefalco, St. Matthew, and St. Paul parishes. (More about the family of parishes in the next couple of weeks.)

** Please note that we will not have 7:30 am Mass this Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. I will be on a mini-retreat in Pennsylvania and there is not the clergy available to cover these Masses. Here is a clear practical consequence in the growing decline of available clergy. The good news is that you don't have to go far to a neighboring church for Mass. We are not 10 or 20 miles from another church, probably no more than 2 miles! Visiting clergy can celebrate the 7:30 am Mass on Thursday and the 8:30 am Mass on Friday, thanks be to God!

About today's hymns

Our opening hymn, **Joyful**, **joyful**, **we adore thee** (*Ritual Song* 669), was written by Henry van Dyke in 1907 while he was guest preacher at Wil-

liams College, in the Berkshire, Williamstown, Massachusetts. His son told the story that his father "came down to breakfast one morning and placed the manuscript on the table before college president Henry August Garfield (son of James Garfield, the 20th President of the United States), saying "here is a hymn for you. Your mountains were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven's *Hymn to Joy*." The text of this hymn is characteristic of the optimism of its nature loving author and of American attitudes in general prior to World War I. *Hymn to Joy* is the theme of the final movement of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. In June the Detroit Symphony will be present this symphony as the conclusion of its season.

The tune of our preparation hymn, Where Charity and Love Prevail (*Ritual Song* 747), is familiar to us as it is the tune which is the basis for the setting of the Mass we sing during the seasons of Advent and Lent. It was composed by Dom Paul Benoit, a twentieth century Benedictine monk, organist, and composer. Born in 1893, Benoit first began to feel called to the vocation of a Benedictine monk during World War I. After the Armistice of 1918, he entered a retreat at the Benedictine Abbey of St. Maurice and St. Maur, at Clervaux in Luxembourg, and joined the abbey in 1919, taking his vows in 1921 and being ordained into priesthood 1926. An accomplished organist, he composed many works for the organ with Gregorian chant being his primary inspiration along with the music of Johann Sebastian Bach, Louis Vierne, Claude Debussy, and Maurice Ravel. He had a complex personality; on one hand, he was a shy, sensitive, and timid man, who had a great need for love and appreciation, yet had difficulty relating to other people. On the other hand he was sometimes jealous and could be very dominant, even authoritarian, although he was fundamentally a deeply humble man with a sentimental streak, with a certain naiveté and enthusiasm. The text is a paraphrase of the Latin hymn *Ubi caritas* which is attributed to Paulinus of Aquileia in 796, and is one of the antiphons traditionally used for the washing of feet on Holy Thursday.

Our communion hymn, **Life-giving Bread, Saving Cup** (*Ritual Song* 920), is an adaptation of a text from the *Didache*, a brief anonymous early Christian treatise written in Koine Greek, dated by modern scholars to the first or second century. The text, parts of which constitute the oldest extant written catechism, has three main sections dealing with Christian ethics, rituals such as baptism and Eucharist, and Church organization. The composer, James Chepponis, is a priest of the Pittsburgh diocese.

Our closing hymn, Hail, Holy Queen Enthroned Above (*Ritual Song* 883) is a translation of the *Salve Regina*, mater misericordia, a Marian hymn and one of four Marian antiphons sung at different seasons within the liturgical calendar. The *Salve Regina* is traditionally sung at Compline (Night Prayer) in the time from the Saturday before Trinity Sunday until the Friday before the first Sunday of Advent. This English translation first appeared in *The Roman Missal* in 1884; the modern melody first appeared in 1736. The *Hail Holy Queen* is also the final prayer of the Rosary.



Stewardship Thoughts

In today's Gospel from the evangelist St. John, Jesus presents a new directive to His followers: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. Jesus further declares that everyone will know His disciples because of their love for one another. The Scripture passages from the Acts of the Apostles and Book of Revelation affirm God's presence in the lives of disciples who face trials for practicing their faith. Full discipleship in the Lord requires a total sacrificial love for others. In Unleash the Gospel, Archbishop Vigneron emphasizes: Growing as his disciples demands a daily surrender to the one who loved us and gave his life for us: "I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Gal 2:20) (Read, Unleash the Gospel, Marker 9.2, Grow). In a spirit of evangelization, disciples who center their lives in Christ give their God-given gifts of prayer, service, and generosity to their parish and their neighbors in need. When determining their weekly financial sacrificial offering to God, faithful stewards give back their "first fruits" to the Lord — not just what remains after their monthly expenses are paid. Remember, God's generosity is never outdone.

FORMING OUR FAITH

Why Should I enroll my child in Faith Formation Class??

For children and young people, religious education is where the parish accompanies parents on the journey of sharing the Gospel with their children and forming them as they grow into mature young Catholic Christians. It cannot be emphasized enough that the parents are the first, and best, teachers of their children. What you do in your home will echo down the years of the lives of your children. YOU are the Domestic Church! And the Our Lady Star of the Sea religious education program is here to help in this process.

The first task of religious education, at home and at the parish, is evangelization. That means developing a personal relationship with Jesus. Pope Francis put it this way in his letter "The Joy of the Gospel" --

"Jesus Christ loves you! He gave his life to save you; and now he is living at your side, every day, to enlighten, strengthen, and free you."

When you were baptized, and when a child is baptized, by the Grace of God we receive the capacity to believe, what is known in Latin as "virtus fidei" -- the virtue of faith. But the Sacrament of Baptism is not magic. To grow in the Christian life, to become a true disciple of the Lord, requires explicit personal faith -- the "actus fidei" or "Act of Faith." Parents promise this on behalf of their children at baptism and it is their responsibility to help their children to "act on their faith" in accordance with age and maturity.

The parents are the first and best evangelizers of their children. The major sacramental moments that children experience -- First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion, and Confirmation -- are important way stations on the journey of faith, but the journey doesn't end with them, it only begins.
