About today's hymns



Our opening hymn, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" (*Ritual Song,* no. 743) was written by the eighteenth century English hymn writer Charles Wesley. Wesley wrote over 6,000 hymns (some believe the number is closer to 6,500). This hymn is a paro-

dy of a secular song by John Dryden from the fifth act of his opera *King Arthur*. Wesley's reuse of this material was not an effort to take advantage of something new and trendy but an expression of his conviction that nothing was beyond redemption or could not be enlisted for God's purposes. The text is rich with scriptural allusions, including Philippians 2: 5-11, John 1: 14, Isaiah 57: 15, Psalm 106: 4, Deuteronomy 28: 65 (stanza 1); John 10: 10, Malachi 3: 1, I Corinthians 3: 16-19, Revelation 22: 3, and I Thessalonians 5: 17 (stanza 2); and II Corinthians 5: 17, Galatians 6: 5, II Peter 3: 14, Psalm 51: 12, Luke 2: 30, II Corinthians 3: 18, and Revelation 4:10 (stanza 3). Its tune, *Hyfrydol* (pronounced *huv-rod-ol*) is one of many fine Welsh tunes which have made their mark on hymnody. It was composed by Rowland Huw Pritchard, and it is his most famous tune. Pritchard worked as a loom tender in a Welsh flannel company. He had a fine voice and was a song leader in his church at a time when musical culture was at a low ebb; there was not a single choir in his part of the country. It is said he composed this tune when he was twenty years old; he published it in a collection intended for the use of his church's Sunday School. His contribution to Welsh music is extensive, including a music instruction book for children. An interesting fact about this tune is that with one exception the melody lies within the first five notes of the scale, making it a very singable and easy tune to sing.

Our preparation hymn, "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy," (*Ritual Song*, no. 742) was written by Frederick William Faber and was first published in 1854 for use during parish missions he conducted in both England and Ireland. Faber studied at Oxford University, where he as a student became active in the Tractarians, a religious group which was the beginning of what became known as the Oxford Movement, a movement which insisted on the church's authority to teach catholic truth to the English as the divinely commissioned agent of Christ and his apostles. Their exploration of this authority began a movement which decisively affected English Christianity's understanding of sanctity, worship, and religious practice. The name Tractarians is derived from a series of pamphlets, or tracts, which expounded on church teaching as well as addressing issues of conflict between the government and the Church. Faber was deeply influenced by John Henry Newman, and, like Newman, eventually converted to Catholicism and became a priest. Faber founded a branch of Newman's order, the Priests of the Congregation of St. Philip Neri and, after his conversion, wrote one hundred and fifty hymns.

Our communion hymn, "The King of Love My Shepherd Is" (*Ritual Song*, no. 766) is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 23 by Henry Williams Baker and was first published in 1868. Baker was an English baron and was a high churchman, which means that in his worship and spiritual practice he valued highly ceremonial and disciplines rooted in tradition. He also had a practical bent of mind as reflected in two devotional books he published for his parish: "Family Prayers for the Use of the Those Who Have to Work Hard," and "Daily Textbook." Following the lead of the great hymnwriters Martin Luther and Isaac Watts, Baker introduces New Testament Christianity into the psalm paraphrase: the cup becomes the eucharistic chalice (stanza four), the cross takes its place with the rod and staff (stanza three), and the pastoral caretaker assumes the role of the "Good Shepherd" in St John's gospel (John 10: 11-18, stanza five.) The entire third stanza is based on one of Jesus' parables, which is today's Gospel lesson. The tune, *St. Columba*, is a traditional Irish melody and is named for St. Columba, who brought Christianity to Ireland and incidentally was the first to report sighting the Loch Ness monster.

Our closing hymn, "Amazing Grace" (*Ritual Song*, no. 737), was written by John Newton, an ex-slave ship captain who became a leading Anglican evangelical and who was largely self-taught. The son of a ship-master, he went to sea at an early age, first as a midshipman in the Royal Navy. He eventually became a the master of a slave ship. Deeply influenced by the reading of the Bible and the *Imitation of Christ* by Thomas à Kempis, Newton was converted during a storm at sea. He left the sea to become a tide surveyor in Liverpool, during which time he prepared for ordination in the Church of England by studying Hebrew and Greek and reading theological literature. Ultimately he become rector of St. Mary's, Woolnoth, in the city of London, where he drew together a large congregation and increased his influence in the evangelical movement. During the latter part of his life he was very active in the anti-slavery movement, and lived long enough to hear the news that Parliament had abolished the British slave trade in 1807. Newton wrote this hymn sometime before 1779. It is based on King David's questioning prayer: "Who am I, O Lord God,... that Thou hast brought me this far?" (I Chronicles 17: 16-17.) The original title of this hymn was "Faith's review and expectation." As with other hymns of Newton, "Amazing Grace" is autobiographical, alluding to his conversion, and that change of lifestyle that it led to, together with a sense of thanksgiving for the guiding hand of God in his life. Newton wrote his own epitaph: *John Newton clerk / once an Infidel and Libertine / A servant of slaves in Africa / was by the rich mercy of our Lord and Saviour / Jesus Christ / Preserved, restored, pardoned / and appointed to preach the Faith / He had long laboured to destroy.*







Stewardship Thoughts


Today's Scripture readings focus on God's divine mercy and forgiveness. In the Book of Exodus, Moses pleads with God to be merciful to the Israelites, who sinned by fashioning and venerating a golden calf. St. Paul, in his First Letter to Timothy, illustrates God's mercy in spite of his own former ignorance and arrogance in persecuting Christians. This topic of mercy and forgiveness culminates in the Gospel (long form), when the evangelist St. Luke narrates Jesus' proclamation to the Pharisees: the parable of the Prodigal Son, including the jubilation his father expresses upon his return. As humble stewards, we recognize our unworthiness and seek the Lord's mercy and forgiveness for all sins. Through God's example of forgiveness, we also strive to forgive those who "trespass against us." Has anyone wronged us who we need to forgive? Do we need forgiveness from someone we have wronged? Participating in Confession and the graces that flow from it may make this process easier.
