Well it is that time of the year when "things" start to move faster and before you know it the end of the year will be here!

This Sunday we celebrate the *Rite of Enrollment* with our young candidates who desire to be confirmed in the spring of next year. In this Rite they express their commitment and engagement during this more intense period of study and reflection in preparation of receiving the Holy Spirit and the

Sacrament. The Sacrament of Confirmation, like all the sacraments we receive, is not meant to be "one and done" but only the beginning of God's Grace in an aspect of our life. The Sacrament of Confirmation is not some type of graduation of religious or faith formation but only the beginning of *putting into action* the faith received on the day of baptism.

Please pray for our candidates and their families making this commitment this Sunday. Next Sunday we will have our *Rite of Enrollment* for those preparing this year to receive

their First Holy Communion next spring. The same understanding exists for this simple ritual. We all know the significance of receiving our First Holy Communion and we know it, again, is not "one and done." The joy we have each and every Mass, Sunday after Sunday, to gather around the Lord's Table with the larger community and receive real and present, the actual, Body and Blood of Jesus Christ!! No wonder there is always such joy and wonder in receiving Jesus in Holy Communion!

\*\* As you read elsewhere in this paper, Mr. Glenn Miller has accepted a very honored position in Portland, Oregon. You can read about it in his article. When Glenn joined our staff last year, I was certainly thinking, and hoping, that he will be with us for a number of years. God again had a different idea! His talents and gifts have been very much appreciated here at Star. It has been very nice to have such a world renown, and Grammy winner, in our midst!! Next weekend will be his last here at Star and he will be driving out to Portland to begin his new ministry in Portland at the start of next month.

\*\* I hope you are reading and educating yourself regarding Proposal 3 on the upcoming Nov. ballot in Michigan. As you know, the bishops of Michigan are asking the people to vote no on this proposal for many reasons. According to the language of the ballot proposal, it would allow abortions to be performed by *anyone*, at any point in pregnancy, and for any reason. It would also disregard any state laws regulating the safety, quality and any inspections of any place that calls itself an abortion clinic. There would be no health and safety regulations for any abortion clinic! In addition, parental consent would not be needed for those teenagers who seek an abortion. (The same would apply for a teen seeking any gender reassignment surgery.) This is just some of the reasons why the electorate is being told this proposal is too extreme.

Please continue to educate yourself regarding Proposal 3 through the materials provided here in our bulletin, on our website, or that of the Michigan Catholic Conference at micatholic.org.

# **Opposing Proposal 3**

Over the last three weeks, we've been covering some of the more startling provisions contained in

Proposal 3 (the "Reproductive Freedom for All" proposal). In addition to creating a State constitutional right to take the life of an innocent, unborn baby, the proposal's text authorizes minors to obtain abortions without parental consent or notification ("every individual" has the right), allows minors to obtain sterilization procedures without parental consent or notification (defines "reproductive freedom" to include "sterilization"), and permits mothers to take their child's life through nine months of pregnancy, provided that an abortionist says the abortion was necessary to protect the mother's "mental health," a truck-sized loophole. In addition, Proposal 3 limits the State's power to pass prolife laws unless the law supports a "compelling state interest achieved by the least restrictive means." In the legal world, this standard is known as "strict scrutiny," and the government can almost never satisfy it. In fact, the U.S. Supreme Court rejected strict scrutiny as the appropriate standard for analyzing pro-life laws in Planned Parenthood v. Casey. But Proposal 3 goes farther, defining a "compelling" state interest only as one "for the limited purpose of protecting the health of an individual seeking care." Incredibly, that means the State would be prohibited from passing a law to stop abortions based on the baby's sex, race, or disability, or even for the purpose of protecting the unborn baby's life! And any such laws cannot interfere with the mother's "autonomous decision-making," replacing the familiar "informed consent" standard that applies to every medical procedure with a watered-down "voluntary consent" standard. No matter how a voter feels about abortion, Michigan's Constitution should not be amended to prohibit the State from passing laws that protect innocent, unborn life or to pass safety regulations for abortion procedures that ensure mothers are fully informed before they choose to take their baby's life. Please tell everyone you know: vote "NO" on Proposal 3 on November 8th.

#### About today's hymns

Our opening hymn, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore You" (*Ritual Song*, no. 669) was written by Henry van Dyke in 1907 while he was guest preacher at Williams College, in the Berkshire, Williamstown, Massachusetts. His son told the story that his father "came

down to breakfast one morning and placed the manuscript on the table before college president Henry August Garfield (son of James Garfield, the 20<sup>th</sup> President of the United States), saying "here is a hymn for you. Your mountains were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven's *Hymn to Joy*." The text of this hymn is characteristic of the optimism of its nature loving author and of American attitudes in general prior to World War I.

Our preparation hymn, "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy," (*Ritual Song*, no. 742) was written by Frederick William Faber and was first published in 1854 for use during parish missions he conducted in both England and Ireland. Faber studied at Oxford University, and was deeply influenced by John Henry Newman, and, like Newman, he eventually converted to Catholicism and became a priest. Faber founded a branch of Newman's order, the Priests of the Congregation of St. Philip Neri and, after his conversion, wrote one hundred and fifty hymns.

Our communion hymn, "Eat This Bread" (*Ritual Song*, no. 928) is based on John 6:35, and was composed by Jacques Berthier, a French composer of liturgical music, best known for writing much of the music used at Taizé,

an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity founded in 1940 in Taizé, Saône-et Loire, Burgundy, France. Today the community is composed of more than one hundred brothers, from Catholic and Protestant traditions, who originate from about thirty countries around the world. Taizé has become one of the world's most important sites of Christian pilgrimage, with a focus on youth. Over 100,000 young people from around the world make pilgrimages to Taizé each year for prayer, Bible study, sharing, and communal work. Through the community's ecumenical outlook, they are encouraged to live in the spirit of kindness, simplicity and reconciliation. Over nearly twenty years, Berthier built up a body of church music that has been utilized around the world. The primary characteristic of this music are simple refrains which are easy to learn and repeated over and over, ideally suited for the meditative nature of the community's worship.


Our closing hymn, "How Great Thou Art" (*Ritual Song*, no. 663) is of Swedish origin. It was written in 1885 by Carl Gustav Boberg, a Swedish pastor, as a result of his experience in a midday thunderstorm where moments of flashing violence were followed by a clear brilliant sun. After the storm he heard the song of birds in nearby trees. It is reported that he then fell on his knees in "humble adoration to God." Shortly after this he wrote a nine-stanza poem which included the four stanzas of this hymn. Several years later he was visiting a congregation and heard them singing his poem to this old Swedish folk melody.

#### A personal note from Glenn Miller

In August I received an invitation from Trinity Cathedral, Portland, Oregon, to join its staff as artist-in-residence, an invitation I have accepted. Trinity Cathedral has one of the leading church music programs in the Pacific Northwest, and for nearly twenty years I have been associated with and a mentor to and teacher of its newly appointed Director of Music, Katie Burk Webb. This association began when she was eleven years old and first began attending the Royal School of Church Music in America Choristers' Training Course at King's College, Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania, a Course I've been associated to this day since its founding in 1992. Her connection with the Course began when she and her twin sister at age eleven were in the intermediate girls' choir I was directing. Katie and her sister became annual attendees of the course, and their talents and potential as future leaders in church music, organ, and conducting were clearly evident from their earliest years on the course. Following their undergraduate education I began to include them on the music faculty where they rose up rapidly through the ranks to various leadership positions. Katie went on to do her master's and doctorate in organ and church music at Indiana University, and the past two years served Trinity Cathedral in the number two position of the cathedral's three-person, full time music leadership team. Upon the retirement of her boss this past year, she was named to succeed him. Instead of filling the number two position with a young person fresh out of university, she felt that the music staff needed the balance provided by someone who is seasoned and well established in the profession as she herself gets established in her new role. She immediately reached out to me feeling that, from our experience working together for many years in Wilkes Barre and also because of the role I've had as her mentor, together we would make a great team. Musically and liturgically the cathedral is recognized nationally and even internationally; this past summer the cathedral's choir was in residence at St Paul's Cathedral, London, and St George's Chapel, Windsor. Know too that I am very excited about what lies ahead for Star in its new music minister – you are going to be in very good hands! God truly has a plan for us all, and His hand certainly is at work in all that has unfolded. Know of my prayers for this parish, Msgr, and the new music minister as this new chapter begins in the life of Star of the Sea. My final Sunday here is October 23, and my first Sunday in Portland is November 6. Blessings to you all, and again, thank you for the privilege of serving in your midst.
