Half and Half from Msgr. Gary Smetanka

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ (*Corpus Christi*). We have this great feast to increase our appreciation of this great gift of the Eucharist in our Church and in our lives.

Saint Pope John Paul II gave us his 14th encyclical entitled, "*Ecclesia de Eucharistia*" ("*Church of the Eucharist*"). The encyclical begins with the most simple but direct statements: "The church draws her life from the Eucharist. This truth does not simply express a daily experience of faith, but recapitulates the heart of the mystery of the church."

It can be so simple for us to take for granted this great gift of the eucharist. Maybe we feel we come to Mass so often and it usually seems to be the same thing over and over again. However, if we really contemplate what Christ has done for us in giving us His Body and Blood for our very lives through the celebration of the Mass, we can only be drawn into "profound amazement and gratitude." As Pope John Paul II wrote in his conclusion of the encyclical: "In the humble signs of bread and wine changed into his body and blood, Christ walks beside us as our strength and our food for the journey, and he enables us to become for everyone witnesses of hope. If in the presence of this mystery, reason experiences its limits, the heart, enlightened by the grace of the Holy Spirit, clearly sees the response that is demanded and bows low in adoration and unbounded love."

Maybe some people think of the Eucharist only as the physical, i.e., the sacrament, or the consecrated host and Precious Blood. That is certainly one aspect of the Eucharist. But hopefully we place the physical sacrament into the whole context of the Eucharistic Liturgy or the Mass, because it is from the *celebration* of the Eucharistic Liturgy that we receive the Blessed Sacrament in the host and the Precious Blood. Hence, the Church places utmost importance on the whole Mass and utmost importance on participating in the whole Mass. In "the old days" people were taught that one had to be present at Mass by the proclamation of the Gospel "for Mass to count." In one way that teaching still holds true. Yet, on the other hand, one should be present for the whole celebration of the liturgy of the Word, i.e., by the time of the first reading, for "Mass to count." The Church wants us to experience the presence of God in all these liturgical elements, not only through the Eucharistic elements. The Church also believes so much in this great gift of Jesus himself that she obligates us to participate in this Eucharist each and every Sunday, not just when we feel like it or when there are no sports event, practice, shopping trip or other things to do on a Sunday! This feast is also a good time to remember to be present until the end of Mass as well. The point of Mass is not to simply receive Holy Communion and then leave. The whole experience, the whole prayer, is important. (Do you visit a family members house on Thanksgiving and walk out once you eat the turkey?)

The celebration of the Mass is truly awesome indeed and maybe, ultimately, too mind boggling for us! But the Church gives us the celebration of Mass and the Eucharist so we can encounter Christ in our daily life and then be transformed into that image and presence of Christ in the world around us. The readings and homily are meant, not to necessarily teach or catechize the faith, but to point how the Word of God we hear at Mass is being encountered by us and is alive indeed in the midst of our lives as we hear it! With hearts of gratitude for that presence and action of God in our midst, we then offer that sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, i.e., Jesus in the Eucharist. Jesus then becomes

food for our daily journey so we can be Christ to others in our daily life! Yes- it is mind boggling indeed!** Today is always a good day to be renewed in how to receive the Eucharist. One has the option of receiving Our Lord either on the tongue or in the hand. The majority of people receive in the hand. To do so, one hand should be over the other, kind of cupped to receive Our Lord. Key here is “to receive.” One does not take and grab the host, one **receives** the host and then places the host in the mouth. It is important to not walk away once you receive the host. Out of respect, stop and consume the host before turning and walking away. Be sure to also say “Amen” after the minister says “the Body of Christ.”

LITURGICAL LIFE OF THE PARISH

Eucharistic Processions

The Body of Christ under the form of bread may be carried in solemn procession through public streets. The practice, more frequent in past generations and among certain ethnic groups, is still encouraged.

A Eucharistic procession forms after Mass or after a period of adoration. It is especially appropriate on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. Usually a priest places a large, unbroken, consecrated host inside a glass protector called a lunette. He then inserts the lunette into a monstrance. A monstrance is a beautifully crafted vessel that draws attention to the host.

The priest, vested for Mass or wearing a white cope, holds the monstrance aloft. Ministers carrying candles and incense join him. Additional ministers may carry a canopy above the priest and the monstrance. The faithful join the procession, singing hymns and offering prayers as they walk.

The procession may pause at stations decorated for the occasion, where the priest blesses the faithful with the monstrance. Ideally, the procession begins at one church and ends at another, where the priest gives a final benediction and reposes the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. Alternatively, the procession may return to the church from which it began.

Eucharistic processions evangelize the civic community, as Catholics witness to their faith. Throughout the twentieth century, the faithful began sharing communion at Mass more frequently than they did before, and many Eucharistic devotions faded. The main reason Jesus gave his body and blood was for us to take, eat, and drink. Although some Eucharistic devotions are rarely seen, it is more important to see the faithful sharing communion at Mass.

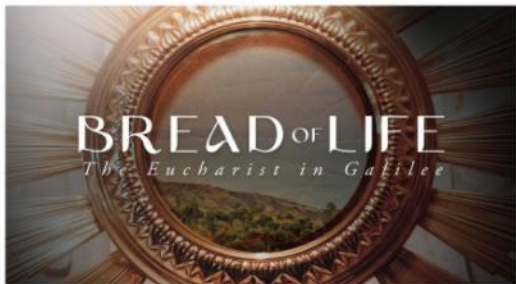

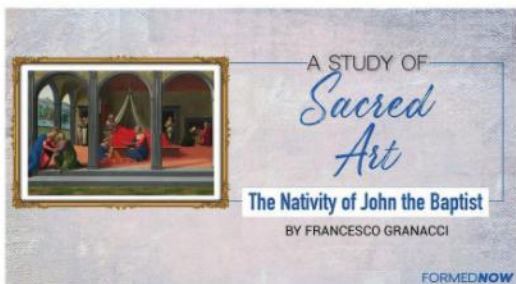
