



The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act requires that St. John's Seminary provide an annual report of certain crime statistics as well as the institutional policies pertaining to campus security. Fire safety information and annual fire statistics are also required for on-campus residence halls under the Higher Education Opportunity Act. St. John's Seminary is providing the following information to all enrolled students and current employees on our website, at SJS.edu.

Data is submitted annually by St. John's Seminary to the federal government regarding criminal offenses, hate crimes, violence against women, arrests, disciplinary actions relating to arrests, and unfounded crimes, which are reported crimes that are found to be baseless or false. Reports are tallied for on campus, on campus in student housing, off campus but reported by students or employees, on public property reported by students or employees, and reported by local police regarding students or employees.

For the calendar years of 2022, 2023, and 2024 to date, there were no incidents reported under the categories listed above to the Boston Police Department. Additionally, although there were occasional false alarms, there were no incidents of actual fire reported to the Boston Fire Department for 2022, 2023, and 2024 to date.

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act is the landmark federal law, originally known as the Campus Security Act, that requires colleges and universities across the United States to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses.

The "Clery Act" is named in memory of 19 year old Lehigh University freshman Jeanne Ann Clery (pictured right) who was raped and murdered while asleep in her residence hall room on April 5, 1986.
